My word to anybody who's thinking about returning back to school and for the people in the military, people who suffer from disabilities that hesitate from returning back to school, one thing I can say is that this place has helped me to build relationships that I thought I was able to never build again. I suffer from a number of different things and it's helped me to be able to start opening up relationships again. I have a long way to go and you know, but at the same time it's taking me further than I was in the past.

I'm proud to be a bronco because I see that there's many people from all different walks of life in all different places throughout the country and even throughout the world that come here to Fayetteville State University. And when they come here, everyone comes with their own little story that they come with but when they leave here they leave here with a better sense of who they are, a better sense of awareness. You know they're out there and they're ready to tackle whatever obstacles that come ahead and in the future you know they build a brotherhood and sisterhood that I don't see in a lot of places and throughout the world that I've been in. I've been in the military. I work with the government and I see that the brotherhood and sisterhood that they have here doesn't -it can't be imitated you know any other place.
