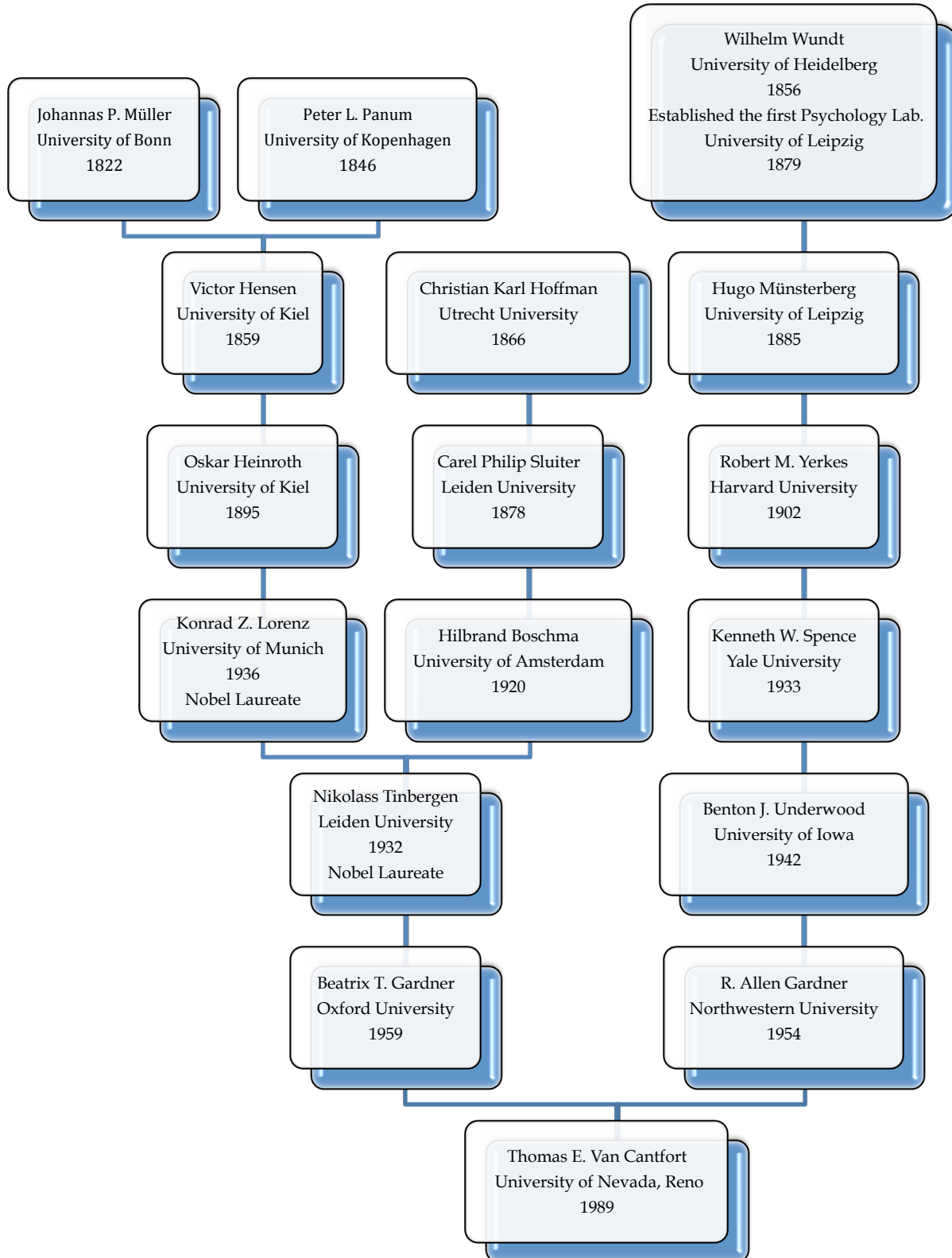

PSYCHOLOGIST:

Wilhelm Wundt - Established the first Psychology laboratory at the University of Leipzig.

Hugo Münsterberg - In 1892, William James invited Münsterberg to teach at Harvard University. He was a pioneer in the fields of Industrial, Experimental, and Clinical Psychology. He believed that causal laws held for mental phenomena in so far as they correlated with physiological processes.

Robert Mearns Yerkes - Yerkes-Dobson Law, Intelligence Studies, and established the first primate laboratory in the United States.

Kenneth Wartinbee Spence - A neobehaviorist, Hull-Spence hypothesis, developed a mathematical model to describe acquisition phase, experimentation with discrimination learning, and absolute stimulus theory.

Benton J. Underwood - One of the pre-eminent leaders in the research on the acquisition and retention of verbal materials, frequently referred to at the time as the study of verbal learning and memory.

R. Allen Gardner - A comparative psychologist focusing on intelligence through exploring the acquisition of American Sign Language in crossfostered chimpanzees.

Thomas Edward Van Cantfort - Evolutionary Biopsychologist.

COMPARATIVE ANATOMY/PHYSIOLOGY/BEHAVIOR

Johannas Peter Müller - Comparative neuroanatomy and physiology, Doctrine of Specific Nerve energy.

Peter Ludvig Panum - Contagious disease (Measles), binocular vision, the "Panum's Fusion Area."

Victor Hensen - A physiologist and marine biologist, coin the word plankton.

Christian Karl Hoffman - Comparative morphology of amphibians and reptiles.

Oskar Heinroth - Comparative morphology, founder of ethology, rediscovered imprinting.

Carel Philip Slutier -- Zoology and anatomy the above link is in Dutch.

Konrad Zacharias Lorenz - Nobel Laureate, a leader in the European School of Ethology. Much of his research focused on imprinting.

Hilbrand Boschma - Comparative vertebrate anatomy, primarily did field-observations on living animals in the sphere of biology.

Nikolass Tinbergen - Nobel Laureate, a leader in the European School of Ethology. A Dutch ethologist, who advocated asking the four questions; causation, ontogeny, phylogeny, and adaptation of behavior. Emphasized Proximate mechanisms and Ultimate mechanisms to explain behaviors.

Beatrix Trixie Gardner - Developmental psychobiologist studying intelligence through exploring the acquisition of American Sign Language in crossfostered chimpanzees.
