ACADEMIC AND STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

Wednesday, September 27, 2023

9:00 AM

The Academic and Student Affairs of the Fayetteville State University Board of Trustees convened September 27, 2023, in the Rudolph Jones Student Center Room 242 and via MS Teams. Chairman, Mr. Brandon Philips presided and called the meeting to order at 9:00a.m. Chairman Philips the welcome and opening remarks.

ROLL CALL

The following Trustee members were in attendance: Mr. Frederick Nelson, Mrs. Joyce Adams, and Mr. Glenn Adams and Ms. Maya Martin.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was moved by Trustee Maya Martin that the minutes of the Academic and Student Affairs Committee meeting held on June 7, 2023, be accepted as printed and distributed. *The motion was seconded by Trustee Glenn Adams.* The motion carried.

ACADEMIC AND STUDENT AFFAIRS UPDATE

Provost and Senior Vice Chancellor Monica T. Leach announced a new appointment in Academic Affairs. Dr. Pamela Baldwin will now serve as the Associate Vice Chancellor for Student Success and Enrollment Management.

Leach provided a snapshot of academic affairs priorities which includes adult learners, military affiliated students, transfer students, academic degree programs and summer school. As a division our goal is to increase retention and graduation rates, strengthen our customer care support to students, faculty, and staff, evolve high demand programs to meet industry needs and enhance the faculty research portfolio. Leach shared that the Bachelor of Science in Supply Chain Management and Technology was approved at Board of Governors on September 13, 2023. The Bachelor of Science in Cybersecurity was offered this Fall with 26 students enrolled. Also, the following degrees were offered during the Fall 2022 – Bachelor of Science in Public Health with 32 students enrolled and Bachelor of Science in Sport and Fitness Management with 117 students enrolled.

Leach shared that FSU's first-time full-time freshmen class was the largest since 2007. FSU reached an all-time high for Military affiliated students. FSU international enrollment doubled by 42 students -24 student athletes. FSU continuing students increased by 10%. Leach provided a snapshot of the fall enrollment comparison 2023 which includes the total by freshman, military, adult learners, and total students. The total freshmen students in 2022 was 786 students and by 2023 there were 806 students. The total adult learners' students in 2022 was 3,150 students and by 2023 there were 3,110 students. The total military students in 2022 was 2,061 students and by 2023 there were 2,168 students. The total amount of students overall in 2022 was 6,787 and by 2023 there were 6,847 students enrolled.

Leach recognized Sponsored Research and Programs for the increase of research funding. We have received the highest awards from July 1 – June 30, 2023, which yielded \$28,765,343. We received 66 awards and submitted 69 proposals. Leach shared that our Fall Commencement will be held on Friday, December 15, 2023, at 10:00am in Capel Arena.

Leach introduced Dr. Pamela Baldwin, Associate Vice Chancellor for Student Success, and Enrollment Management., provided an overview of the Bronco Boost Program. The program was a 7-week transition program where incoming students lived on campus and adjusted to campus life. The program started on June 17, 2023 and ended on July 31, 2023. The students earned 7 credits which included Math, English, and Personal Finance. There were 73 students enrolled and the average GPA was 3.3. The outcome of the program was to create a strong network to facilitate adjustment, produce college graduates through experiential learning opportunities that inform a plan for success in life and increase graduation and retention rates. Baldwin discussed next year's matrix for Bronco Boost. We plan on enrolling 100 first-time freshmen and 35 transfer students. Last year cohorts will more than likely become Bronco Boost mentors.

Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs Juanette Council shared accomplishments for the 2022-2024 division goals. During the 2022-2023 academic year emphasis was placed on providing high quality and easily accessible health care to students which resulted in an increased number of students served. Student Health Services conducted 8,359 medical appointments and the Counseling and Personal Development Center conducted 2,831 counseling appointments and provided services to more than 215 students requesting student disability services accommodations. Additionally, the Bronco Health and Wellness program was launched to increase health education and prevention program offerings and the Division was awarded more than \$657,090 in external grants to promote health and wellness initiatives.

Dr. Council also provided highlights about the division's efforts to create a culture of care which included launching the FSU Mentoring Initiative Program designed to increase retention and graduation rates, awarding more than \$14,522 to 31 students in need through the Broncos Helping Broncos Assistance Program, and helping more than 710 students experiencing food insecurities through the FSU Food Pantry which was a 146% increase in usage over the previous year.

The Division of Student Affairs also customized New Student Orientation to meet the diverse needs of residential, adult learners, commuters, first- generation, and military/ military affiliated students resulting in a 13.2 % increase in the number of students who attended orientation over last year of which 96% enrolled in Fall 2023 classes. During the 2022-2023 academic year, the division provided co-curricular facilities to promote a sense of belonging and community development among students. Residence Life maintained a 96.5% occupancy rate including the temporary off-site housing facility which accommodated 160 students and approximately \$1,250,000 in repairs and renovation projects were completed in the Residence Halls.
