ACADEMIC AND STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

Wednesday, March 22, 2023 9:00 AM

The Academic and Student Affairs of the Fayetteville State University Board of Trustees convened Wednesday, March 22, 2023, in the Rudolph Jones Student Center Room 242 and via MS Teams. Vice Chairman, Mr. Frederick Nelson, presided and called the meeting to order at 9:00a.m. Chairman Nelson gave the welcome and opening remarks.

ROLL CALL

The following Trustee members were in attendance: Mr. Frederick Nelson, Mrs. Joyce Adams, and Mr. Glenn Adams.

Staff persons in attendance were Mr. Darrell Allison, Mrs. Samantha Holmes, Ms. Joy Cook, Dr. Juanette Council, Attorney Wanda Jenkins, Mr. Wesley Fountain and Dr. Lillian Wanjagi.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was moved by Trustee Glenn Adams that the minutes of the Academic and Student Affairs Committee meeting held on December 7, 2022, be accepted as printed and distributed. *The motion was seconded by Trustee Joyce Adams*. The motion carried.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS UPDATE

Provost and Senior Vice Chancellor Monica T. Leach discussed our 5-year strategic enrollment plan which includes our enrollment goal of 8,000 students by 2027.

Provost Leach provided a snapshot of the 2022 fall enrollment comparison which includes the total by freshman, military, adult learners, and total students. The total freshmen students in 2022 was 786 and in 2021 there was 632 students. The total military students in 2022 was 2,031 students and in 2021 there were 1,779 students. The total adult learners' students in 2022 3,150 and there was 3,248 students. The total amount of students overall in 2022 was 6,787 and there was 6,748 students in 2021.

Provost Leach provided a snapshot of the spring enrollment comparison 2023 which includes the total by freshman, military, adult learners, and total students. The total freshmen students 2022 was 37 students and by 2023 there were 69 students. The total adult learners' students in 2022 was 3,027 students and by 2023 there were 3,060 students.

The total military students in 2022 was 1,696 students and by 2023 there were 2,028 students. The total amount of students overall in 2022 was 6,276 and by 2023 there were 6,355 students enrolled.

Provost Leach provided an update on the strategy to increase enrollment to 7000, which includes increasing recruitment at Fayetteville Technical Community College and other community colleges, targeting student name purchases, improving scholarship options, implementing the BlackCommon Application, increasing presence in targeted recruitment areas, enhancing communication, and creating partnership and marketing with Fort Bragg. Retention is key to enhance strategies to keep students on track to graduation with our Student Success Initiatives.

Following, Provost Leach introduced Dr. Teresa Thompson-Pinckney, Associate Vice Chancellor for Student Success and Enrollment Management, who provided an overview of the Bronco Opportunity Scholarship. The scholarship is a need-based award designed to reduce the cost of undergraduate tuition, ease financial stress, and make earning a college degree more achievable. There will be a total of 3 Cohorts. Students will receive 4-year renewable scholarships and a laptop in the first year to help meet their digital needs. Dr. Thompson-Pinckney shared the basic selection criteria for the scholarships, the marketing strategies, and timeline.

Dr. Nicole Lucas, Associate Vice Chancellor Institutional, Effectiveness, Research and Planning presented on the 30-60-90 initiative. Over 1,000 students have been accepted into the 30-60-90 Free Summer School initiative. The Steering Committee has instituted 30-60-90 Student Ambassadors to market the program in effort to help increase student participation. The deadline to apply for the 30-60-90 Free Summer School is May 20, 2023.

Lastly, Dr. Pamela Baldwin, Interim Vice Chancellor for Enrollment Management, provided an overview of the Summer Bridge Program. The program is a 7-week transition program where incoming students can live on campus to adjust to campus life during the summer following their high school graduation. Orientation is scheduled for June 15 – 16, 2023. Following, the program will start on June 17, 2023, and end on July 31, 2023. The students will earn 7 credits towards Math, English, and Personal Finance. Bronco Boost has received 36 applications for peer mentors and interviews took place the week of March 6, 2023.

STUDENT AFFAIRS UPDATE

Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs, Juanette Council, provided an update on the McLeod Hall renovation project. McLeod hall transitioned from active to offline effective August 31, 2022. The renovation project is scheduled for completion in October 2023. The current residence life plan increases the number of on-campus housing beds from 1,415 in 2023-2024 to 1,875 spaces in the 2023-2024 academic year resulting from the construction of the new residence hall and the reopening of McLeod Hall. With the completion of these two projects, 68% of all residential spaces will be in the East-North quadrant of campus. The

Campus Master Plan will guide campus development on how best to meet the university's current and future housing needs.



3-Year Snapshot Fall & Spring Graduation Comparison


















Usage Heat Map





First-Time Freshmen 2022-2023 Outcomes Faculty Alert Attendance Concerns (EAB Navigate)





McLeod Hall Update

FAYETTEVILLE
STATE UNIVERSITY

- McLeod Hall renovation project is *tentatively* scheduled for completion in October 2023.
- University is seeking temporary off-campus housing accommodations for upper-classmen students for the 2023-2024 academic year.
 - State Property Office:
 - Negotiated a temporary lease agreement for Summer 2023 at Bronco 2.0.
 - Required RFP process for 2023-2024 academic year.
 - Deadline for receiving proposals in the State Property Office is May 24, 2023, at 4:00 pm via NC-BIDS



Fall 2023 Strategies

Utilizing McLeod Hall as transitional housing space opening in October 2023 for:

- Deferred move-In students residing in Cumberland County
- Overflow housing students in temporary spaces (select 3 party rooms; host mentee rooms)
- Fall 2023 second 8-week housing applicants and late/waiting list housing applicants
- Spring 2024 new students housing

Logistical considerations:

- Solicit students who volunteer to be "Broncos' Up" Host Mentees. They will receive a reduced housing rate for the Fall 2023 semester. Suggested Host Mentees may be from diverse groups of student leaders/athletes/volunteers who agree to host another resident for 6-8 weeks until McLeod opens.
- Oversized student rooms (formerly 3 party rooms) in New Residence Hall and Hackley
 Hall will be used as the overflow rooms for McLeod Hall transition students. Students will
 sign up voluntarily.
- Students moving into McLeod Hall will be charged a lower room rate (similar to the 8-week housing rate) for the academic year.
- McLeod Hall student welcome party will be like Operation Smooth Move in support and festiveness
- McLeod Hall move in for staff and residents to occur before Homecoming 2023





Emotional and Well-Being Survey N=309




