The Legal, Audit, Risk, and Compliance (LARC) Committee of the Fayetteville State University Board of Trustees convened Wednesday, December 13, 2023, in the Rudolph Jones Student Center, Multi-Purpose Room 242, and via Microsoft Teams. The meeting was called to order at 11:07 a.m., by Chair Glenn Adams.

ROLL CALL

The following Trustee members were in attendance: Mr. Glenn Adams, Dr. Warren McDonald, Mr. John McFadden, Mr. Frederick Nelson, Mr. Jerry Gregory, and Dr. Kimberly Jeffries Leonard

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was moved by Trustee Warren McDonald and seconded by Trustee Frederick Nelson that the September 27 minutes be approved, as distributed. The motion carried.

LARC UPDATE

Vice Chancellor Jenkins introduced Assistant Vice Chancellor for Risk and Compliance Elizabeth Hunt. AVC Hunt discussed recent and upcoming compliance-focused events and training. The training will include mandatory Annual Compliance and Ethics training, reporting and corrective action, and guidance on the University's Ethical Conduct policy. The Office of Equity and Compliance will offer individual training for each department, focus on high-risk compliance and ethics topics, and offer guidance on reporting concerns. Lastly, student group training regarding Title IX and Conduct will be offered in partnership with Student Affairs and the Office of Title IX.

Vice Chancellor Jenkins introduced Associate Vice Chancellor/Police Chief Roberto Bryan. Chief Bryan discussed the Clery Act and other laws governing campus safety. The first act discussed was the Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2008, which requires higher education institutions to disclose additional information about the security and fire safety policies and standards in their Annual Security Report. The second act discussed was the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013. This act requires higher institutions to collect and report statistics, establish disciplinary proceedings, and ensure training awareness regarding sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. Chief Bryan shared four slides showing collected data and statistics. The first slide showed a decline in FSU's four-year comparison of reported rape/fondling, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, and motor vehicle theft. The second slide showed FSU's 2023 arrests and referrals compared to WSSU, NCCU, NCA&T, and ECSU. The third slide showed FSU's statistics on arrests for liquor law violations, drug-related violations, and weapon possession compared to our counterparts (WSSU, NCCU, NCA&T, and ECSU). The last slide showed FSU's traffic-enforced statistics that reflected traffic stops, citations, arrests, and searches compared to WSSU, NCCU, NCA&T, and ECSU.

Chairwoman Kimberly Jeffries Leonard voiced the following questions to Chief Bryan regarding traffic stops:

Question:It was mentioned that over 400 of the 545 citations were written onMurchisonRd. Is Murchison Rd part of Fayetteville State's campus?

Response: Yes Ma'am

Question: Are you saying some of this is due to new officers learning how to perform traffic stops? Because the numbers are extremely high. Help me make it make sense.

Response: Since I've been here, we have hired seven brand-new rookie officers. Now that we have city-wide jurisdiction, we are able to patrol beyond FSU's campus.

Chancellor Allison requested an updated data report to reflect traffic stops made on campus and off campus.

Vice Chancellor Jenkins introduced Mr. Jesse Chroman, the University's new Director of Internal Audit. Mr. Chroman shared with the Committee his past experience in internal auditing. Mr. Chroman discussed changes to the Internal Audit Charter and the Legal, Audit, Risk and Compliance Committee Charter.

ACTION ITEMS

The following 2 action items were recommended by the Legal, Audit, Risk, and Compliance Committee to the full Board for approval:

Action Item LARC-1 – Proposed Revisions to the Internal Audit Charter

As required by North Carolina General Statutes, the North Carolina Council of Internal Auditing, and the standards prescribed by The Institute of Internal Auditors, the internal audit function necessitates drafting a charter to outline its respective role and responsibilities as well as provide guidance in the performance of assigned duties. The Director of Internal Audit is proposing that the current Internal Audit Charter be updated.

Trustee Warren McDonald made a motion to approve changes to the Internal Audit charter, and Trustee Fred Nelson seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Action Item LARC-2 – Proposed Revisions to the Board of Trustees LARC Committee Charter

As required by North Carolina General Statutes, the North Carolina Council of Internal Auditing, and the standards prescribed by The Institute of Internal Auditors, it is necessary for the Board of Trustees LARC Committee to have a charter that outlines the Committee's role and responsibilities as well as to provide guidance in the performance of its assigned duties. The Director of Internal Audit is proposing that the current LARC Committee Charter be updated.

Trustee Warren McDonald made a motion to approve changes to the LARC Committee Charter, and Trustee Fred Nelson seconded the motion. The motion carried.

ADJOURNMENT

The LARC Committee adjourned at approximately 12:04 p.m.

NOTICE TO COMMITTEE

Situation: The University's Internal Audit Function is required to have a Peer Review (external examination) prior to June 2024.

- **Background:** North Carolina General Statutes 143-746(d) necessitates compliance with the standards prescribed by The Institute of Internal Auditors. Standard 1312 prescribes that external assessments must be conducted at least once every five years and that the board be informed of the frequency of assessments.
- Assessment: Resulting from vacancy within the Director of Internal Audit position, University Management and the Director of Internal Audit have agreed additional time is required to gather and generate the necessary work product which will be sufficient for review by the qualified examiners. The Internal Audit function will rectify this lapse in compliance within calendar year 2024 by utilizing the Council of Internal Auditing's Peer Review Program to ensure an examination is performed and a report is issued by December 2024.
- Action: No action is required by the Board. However, please note that further communications will be forthcoming concerning the progress and nature of the Peer Review.




2023-24 TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT STATISTICS




