#### ACADEMIC AND STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

### Wednesday, June 7, 2023 9:00 AM

The Committee on Academic and Student Affairs of the Fayetteville State University Board of Trustees convened June 7, 2023, in the Rudolph Jones Student Center Room 242 and via Microsoft Teams. Vice Chairman, Mr. Frederick Nelson, presided and called the meeting to order at 9:00a.m. Vice Chairman Nelson gave the welcome and opening remarks.

### **ROLL CALL**

The following Trustee members were in attendance: Mr. Frederick Nelson, Mrs. Joyce Adams, Mr. Glenn Adams and Ms. Maya Martin.

Staff persons in attendance were Mr. Darrell Allison, Mrs. Samantha Holmes, Ms. Joy Cook, Dr. Juanette Council, Attorney Wanda Jenkins, Mr. Wesley Fountain and Dr. Lillian Wanjagi.

### APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was moved by Trustee Glenn Adams that the minutes of the Academic and Student Affairs Committee meeting held on March 23, 2023, be accepted as printed and distributed. *The motion was seconded by Trustee Joyce Adams*. The motion carried.

### ACADEMIC AFFAIRS UPDATE

Provost and Senior Vice Chancellor Monica T. Leach provided a three-year graduation snapshot. The total number of graduates in 2022 was 1659; there are 1,427 students pending degree clearance for 2023. Leach provided a three-year summer enrollment snapshot. The total number of students enrolled in Summer I 2022 was 3,649 and by Summer I 2023 there were 4,176 which is an increase of 527 students.

The fall enrollment comparison 2023 which includes the total by freshman, military, transfer, adult learners, and total students. The total freshmen students 2022 was 786 students and by 2023 there were 74 students. The total adult learners' students in 2022 was 3,150 students and by 2023 there were 1,730 students. The total transfer students in 2022 were 1,020 and by 2023 there were 285 students. The total number of military students in 2022 was 2,061 students and by 2023 there were 1,181 students. The total amount of students overall in 2022 was 6,787 and by 2023 there were 3,804 students enrolled.

Leach discussed the top high schools and transfer community colleges that are trending for 2023. The top high schools are Seventy First, Hoke County, E.E. Smith, Cross Creek

International Westover and Phillip O Berry High Schools. The top transfer community colleges are Fayetteville Technical, Wake Technical, Sandhills, Bladen, Richmond, Central, Central Piedmont, Sampson and Robeson Community College.

Leach introduced Dr. Pamela Baldwin, Interim Vice Chancellor for Enrollment Management, she provided an overview of the Strategic Enrollment Plan for 2023-2027. The goal is to increase enrollment to 8,000 by 2027. Sustain a distinctive and identity that reflects FSU's strengths and attracts and retains undergraduate and graduate students, faculty, and staff. Baldwin discussed the recruitment goals which includes increase recruitment, admission, enrollment retention and graduation of a diverse student population, including first-time freshmen, new graduates, military-affiliated, new transfer, and adult learners.

Additionally, Baldwin discussed customer care goals which includes creating an environment where all stakeholders are valued and feel heard by the administration, create an inclusive and engaging campus that recognizes the diversity of prospective and current students and cultivate an environment that boosts morale and fosters a health work environment. Baldwin discussed student success goals which includes to increase our overall retention rate by maintaining the semester-to-semester rate of 90% or greater, create an academic and co-curricular support system that encourages student success and provide resources and opportunities that enhance the roles of faculty and staff in student success.

Leach next introduced Dr. Teresa Thompson-Pinckney, Associate Vice Chancellor for Student Success and Enrollment Management, who provided an overview of the Bronco One Stop and student usage data, Student usage increased from 2,704 to 4,097. The First-time freshmen cohort (preliminary) from Fall 2022 to Spring 2023 was 93% and Registration for Fall 2023 increased from 59% in 2022 to 68% in 2023. Summer registration is at 70%.

Leach introduced Dr. Nicole Lucas, Associate Vice Chancellor Institutional, Effectiveness, Research and Planning. Lucas provided an overview of the 30-60-90 initiative. We have received 2,158 students who have applied into the 30-60-90 Free Summer School initiative.

### STUDENT AFFAIRS UPDATE

Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs, Juanette Council, provided an update on Housing which included information on the 2023-2027 Five Year Residential Student Strategic Plan, the Fall 2023 Housing Application Data Comparison, McLeod Hall renovation project, and plans to utilize temporary off-campus housing for the 2023-2024 academic year. The current residence life plan increases the number of on-campus housing beds from 1415 in 2023-2024 to 1875 spaces in the 2024-2025 academic year. The increase will largely be a result of the construction of the new residence hall and the reopening of McLeod Hall. The Campus Master Plan will guide campus development on how best to meet the university's current and future housing needs. There has been a 52.94 % increase in the total number of housing applications received for Fall 2023 as compared to Fall 2022 from 985 to 1430.

The McLeod Hall renovation project is tentatively scheduled for completion in October 2023.

The university is seeking temporary off-campus housing accommodations for upperclassmen students for the 2023-2024 academic year. The university will implement several strategies to provide housing for students until McLeod Hall re-opens in October.

Council also provided an update on the Division of Student Affairs goal to create and enhance student health and wellness services. During the 2022-2023 academic year, the staff developed a comprehensive strategy to orchestrate a more holistic, integrated approach to student health and wellness. The four-tiered plan encompasses four units within the Division of Student Affairs: Student Health Services, Counseling & Personal Development Center, Intramurals & Recreational Sports and the creation of a new unit, Bronco Health and Wellness.

Council introduced Dr. Dawn Truong, the newly appointed director of Bronco Health and Wellness. Dr. Truong provided a general overview of the newly created unit and shared information about accomplishments realized during the 2022-2023 academic year to include being awarded more than \$535,090.00 in external grants and \$22,500 in external scholarships for Bronco Ambassadors.







## **FALL 2022 ENROLLMENT**






### **FALL 2023 ENROLLMENT TREND**



## **Bronco Health and Wellness Program**

The Bronco Health and Wellness program launched during the 2022-23 Academic Year to improve and maintain the health of the campus-community.

- 700+ student participation in 22 health prevention and awareness programs
- \$535,090+ awarded in external grant funds
- \$22,500.00 external scholarships awarded to the Bronco Wellness Ambassadors Program
- 193.6% increase in student contacts within the intramural & recreational sports program (1,949 in 2021-22 to 5,723 in 2022-23)


