History of Fayetteville State University

In 1867, seven black men - Matthew N. Leary, Jr., A. J. Chesnutt, Robert Simmons, George Grainger, Jr., Thomas Lomax, Nelson Carter, and David A. Bryant - paid \$136 for two lots on Gillespie Street and converted themselves into a self-perpetuating Board of Trustees to maintain this property permanently as a site for the education of black children in Fayetteville. General Oliver O. Howard of the Freedman's Bureau, erected a building on this site, and the institution became known as the Howard School. Robert Harris was selected as the principal.

By a legislative act of 1877, the North Carolina General Assembly provided for the establishment of a Normal School for the education of black teachers. The Howard School was chosen as the most promising because of its successful record during the previous ten years under the leadership of Robert Harris. Its name was changed to the State Colored Normal School and Harris remained as principal until his death in 1880.

Charles W. Chesnutt was principal from 1880 to 1883. He emphasized foreign languages, social graces, and intellectual development as keys to success. He resigned to pursue a literary career and indeed became one of the leading black American writers of fiction between 1887 and 1930.

Ezekiel E. Smith became the third principal in 1883 and would serve three different terms in this leadership position. His first term as principal lasted from 1883-1888. He expanded the curriculum to better prepare teachers for the public grammar schools. In 1888 George Williams became the principal and introduced a Speaker's Series. Smith returned in 1895 after serving as an ambassador in Liberia. In 1898, he left to serve in the Spanish American War. Reverend Leonard E. Fairley served as acting principal until Smith returned in 1899.

Between 1899 and 1933, Dr. E.E. Smith's vision for excellence in teaching would lay the framework for the Normal School to become a college. By the time he retired in 1933, the school had grown from three rooms in a small frame structure to a physical plant of ten buildings on a fifty-acre tract of land. Black and white citizens contributed funds along with Dr. Smith, F. D. Williston, E. N. Williams, J. G. Smith and Dr. P. N. Melchor, to purchase the initial forty acres of land. With the erection of the Aycock Building by the state in 1908, the school began its permanent residency on Murchison Road. Smith's title was changed from principal to president in 1927. The Newbold School, a practice school for teachers, was erected on the campus in 1930. Dr. E.E. Smith's ideas about teacher training set the pace for teacher education throughout the state. His years of service covered a span of fifty years-1883 to 1933.

Dr. James Ward Seabrook became the president in 1933. Under his presidency the school became Fayetteville State Teachers College, thereafter being authorized to grant the Bachelor of Science Degree in Elementary Education. Cultural activities, student organizations, and significant physical expansion contributed to the complete transformation from a normal school to a college. The college received both state and regional accreditation in 1947.

Dr. Rudolph Jones succeeded Dr. Seabrook in 1956. During his administration, the curriculum was expanded to include majors in secondary education and programs leading to degrees outside the teaching field. The name of the school was changed to Fayetteville State College in 1963. FSC students were active participants in the Civil Rights Movement of the sixties and helped to bring about integration in Fayetteville. Also, under the leadership of Dr. Jones, six additions were made to the physical plant to accommodate a rapidly expanding enrollment.

Dr. Charles A. Lyons, Jr. was appointed president in 1969 and the institution acquired its present name. By a legislative act in 1972, Fayetteville State University became a constituent institution of the University of North Carolina System, and Dr. Lyons became its first Chancellor. During his tenure, the curriculum was expanded to include a variety of both baccalaureate and master's level programs. The Fort Bragg-Pope AFB Extension Center, in conjunction with the Weekend and Evening College, was established in order to provide military personnel and other full-time working people with the opportunity to further their education. The general academic structure took its present configuration in 1985 when the university became a Comprehensive Level I Institution. In addition to expanding program offerings and services, eight buildings were added to the physical plant during this period.

On January 1, 1988, Dr. Lloyd V. Hackley became the eighth Chief Executive Officer of the university. In his seven years as Chancellor, the university expanded its master's level program offerings to include biology, business administration, education, English, history, mathematics, psychology, and sociology, and FSU's first doctoral program in Educational Leadership was established. Baccalaureate program offerings were also increased to include 36 disciplines in the arts and sciences, business and economics, and education. Hackley strengthened FSU's community outreach to at-risk children in the public schools and established numerous scholarship and tutoring/mentoring programs to encourage more young people to aspire to academic excellence and a college education. FSU's first major public Capital Campaign was also completed, which enabled the university to increase the number of privately funded scholarships. The student population doubled in numbers and in diversity during his administration. The addition of the ultra-modern School of Business and Economics Building and the Health and Physical Education Building underscored Dr. Hackley's commitment to FSU's continued expansion and growth. On December 31, 1994, Dr. Hackley left his post to become President of the North Carolina Department of Community Colleges, the first African-American to lead the state's system of 59 community colleges.

Dr. Donna J. Benson, Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs of the University of North Carolina served as Interim Chancellor from January 1, 1995 to November 15, 1995. Capital improvements included renovation of dormitories and completion of the Distance Learning Center in the Communications Building.

In 1995 Dr. Willis B. McLeod, a 1964 graduate of Fayetteville State University, became the ninth Chief Executive Officer of FSU and the first alumnus to serve as Chancellor. Among the initiatives he instituted were the "Freshman Year Initiative" (or F.Y.I.), a program designed to enhance students' educational outcomes; new outreach efforts aimed at forging stronger community ties; and formed a regional partnership of public school, community college, and university leaders which focused on strengthening the educational pipeline from pre-school to post-graduate studies. Renovation and improvement of campus facilities were achieved, including all air-conditioned buildings. A strong cultural and fine arts series and fourteen CIAA championships bolstered Bronco Pride.

Dr. T. J. Bryan assumed the position of Chancellor on July 1, 2003. As the tenth chief executive officer of the university, Dr. Bryan was the first African-American woman selected to lead a constituent institution of the University of North Carolina. Dr. Bryan developed new academic programs, obtained specialized accreditation for several programs, strengthened student recruitment and support programs, and improved buildings and grounds. Under her leadership, a four-year nursing program and an Honors Program were established.

In 2007 Dr. Lloyd V. Hackley returned as Interim Chancellor. He launched projects to carry out the initiatives of UNC Tomorrow, placed FSU on a sound course for fiscal solvency, and introduced a number of organizational changes for greater efficiency of operations.

Dr. James A. Anderson was named the eleventh Chief Executive Officer of Fayetteville State University on March 7, 2008. Under Chancellor Anderson's leadership, the university has established a five year strategic plan for growth, expanded academic program offerings, added global education and study abroad, and increased certification and accreditation of academic programs. The university has expanded partnerships with universities, corporations, and the military. Outreach also includes service learning, a community computer center, a Veteran Center, the Early High School College, the Center for Defense and Homeland Security, and many collaborative cultural activities with community agencies.

Dr. Anderson is committed to making FSU a university of choice by enabling students to be successful through advanced technology, new cutting edge academic programs, expanded partnerships with the community and educational institutions, globalism, an improved campus environment, and professional development opportunities for faculty, staff, and students.



Narrative Summary of Student Data

Fall 2015

First Time Freshmen Applications: 2,381 first time freshmen were accepted from a pool of 3,943 applicants for a 60% acceptance rate.

Undergraduate Transfer Applications: 1,358 undergraduate transfer students were accepted from a pool of 1,542 applicants for an 88% acceptance rate.

Graduate Applications: 297 graduate applicants were accepted from a pool of 330 applicants for a 90% acceptance rate.

First Time Freshmen Enrolled: 631 first time freshmen were enrolled from a pool of 2,475 first-time freshman students who were actually accepted. Males represented 38% of first time enrolled freshmen, and females represented 62%. Males represented 32% of the total student population and females comprised 68%.

Ninety-four percent of first time freshmen enrolled had in-state residency. Ninety-six percent of total enrolled students had in-state residency. Whites and Blacks composed 85% percent of first time freshmen enrolled. Blacks composed 81% percent of the first time enrolled freshmen, higher than the 63% of Blacks representing total enrollment for the same period.

The typical first time freshmen enrolled student was female (62%), under 20 (91%), instate (94%), and Black (81%). Most first time enrolled freshmen (57%) had an SAT score of 1000 or less and a HSGPA ranging between 2.01 and 3.50 (73%).

Total Student Enrollment: The total enrollment of 6,104 increased by 205 (3.4%) from Fall 2014. During Fall 2010 - Fall 2015 total enrollment ranged from 5,781 to 6,104.

Sixty-eight percent of the student population was female. Black enrollment was 63% and White individuals represented 20%. Ninety-six percent of the students were from North Carolina, 48% were non-traditional students over the age of 24, and 90% were undergraduates. Seventy-five percent of all students were commuters. The typical enrolled student was female (68%), under 25 (52%), in-state (96%), and Black (63%).

Degrees Awarded 2014-2015: Top three undergraduate degrees awarded were Nursing (137), Criminal Justice (125), and Psychology (119). The top three graduate degrees awarded were Master of Social Work (81), Master of Business Administration (21), and Master of School Administration (17).

Narrative Summary of Student Data

Spring 2016

First Time Freshmen Applications: 50 first time freshmen were accepted from a pool of 87 applicants for a 57% acceptance rate.

Undergraduate Transfer Applications: 639 undergraduate transfer students were accepted from a pool of 731 applicants for a 87% acceptance rate.

Graduate Applications: 79 graduate applicants were accepted from a pool of 75 applicants for a 97% acceptance rate.

First Time Freshmen Enrolled: 36 first time freshmen were enrolled from a pool of 50 first-time freshman students who were actually accepted. Males represented 53% of first time enrolled freshmen, and females represented 47%. Males represented 32% of the total student population and females comprised 68%.


Eighty-nine percent of first time freshmen enrolled had in-state residency. Ninety-six percent of total enrolled students had in-state residency. Whites and Blacks composed 80% percent of first time freshmen enrolled. Blacks composed 69% percent of the first time enrolled freshmen, higher than the 62% of Blacks representing total enrollment for the same period.

The typical first time freshmen enrolled student was male (53%), under 21 (50%), instate (89%), and Black (69%). Twenty-two percent of first time enrolled freshmen had a SAT score of 1000 or less. Fifty-six percent of first time enrolled freshmen had a HSGPA ranging between 2.01 and 3.50.

Total Student Enrollment: The total enrollment of 5,751 increased by 246 (4.3%) from Spring 2015. During Spring 2011- Spring 2016 total enrollment ranged from 5,532 to 5,751.


Sixty-eight percent of the student population was female. Black enrollment was 62% and White individuals represented 20%. Ninety-six percent of the students were from North Carolina, 50% were non-traditional students over the age of 24, and 89% were undergraduates. Seventy-seven percent of all students were commuters. The typical enrolled student was female (68%), under 24 (51%), in-state (96%), and Black (62%).

Degrees Awarded 2015-2016: Top three undergraduate degrees awarded were Nursing (153), Criminal Justice (129), and Psychology (127). The top three graduate degrees awarded were Master of Social Work (79), Master of School Administration (22), and Master of Business Administration (20).




First-time Freshmen Enrolled Spring 2011-2016 By Gender







First-time Freshmen Enrolled Spring 2011-2016 By Age






First-time Freshmen Enrolled Spring 2011-2016 By Residency






First-time Freshmen Enrolled Fall 2010-2015 By High School Class Rank in Quintiles




First-time Freshmen Enrolled Spring 2011-2016 By High School Class Rank in Quintiles




First-time Freshmen Enrolled Fall 2010-2015 By High School Class Rank in Quartiles






Total Student Enrollment for the Fall 2010-2015 By Semester Credit Hours






Total Student Enrollment for the Fall 2010-2015 By Transfer Hours Applied Towards Degree






Fall 2014 Students By Classification

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Faculty & Staff

Personnel

A total of 861 individuals worked at Fayetteville State University as of October 1, 2015. For the past year, of that number, 342 (40%) were faculty (includes full or part-time faculty, administrators with faculty status, retirees on contract, visiting faculty, and coaches with faculty status). The remaining 531 (60%) were administrators or support personnel. Fifty-nine percent of the employees were black, 20% white, 6% Asian, 3%Hispanic, 1% Amer. Indian, 1% Non-Resident Alien, and 10% were of an unknown race. Fifty-eight percent of employees were women and 42% were men.



Faculty

Fayetteville State University had a total of 342 teaching faculty (255 full-time and 87 part-time) as of October 1, 2015. Of the 255 full-time faculty, 83% held the doctorate or 1st professional degree. Of this number, 67% had earned tenure, while 33% were on track. Fifty-one percent of full-time faculty members were male, and 49% were female. Thirty-nine percent of the faculty body were black, 31% white, 12% Asian, 4% Hispanic, 3% Non-Resident Alien, and 11% were of an unknown race. The assistant professor rank accounted for 26% of the faculty, while close to 36% were classified as associate professors. The mean salary of AAUP Faculty (with 11/12 month converted to 9 month) is \$76,150 for males and \$74,989 for females.






Fall 2012-2015 AAUP Faculty Full-time By Gender














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


Fall 2012-2015 AAUP Faculty Full-time By Degree

Demonstrating the Economic Value of Fayetteville State University to the Sandhills and the state of North Carolina

JANUARY 2015

Fayetteville State University (FSU) improves higher education delivery throughout the region and helps students increase their employability and potential. By facilitating new research and drawing students and visitors to the Sandhills, the university also generates new dollars and opportunities for the region. The purpose of this analysis is to assess the impact of FSU on the regional economy, defined as the counties of Cumberland, Bladen, Harnett, Hoke, Moore, Robeson, and Sampson. The analysis also looks at the benefits generated for students, North Carolina as a whole, and taxpayers.

Our analysis shows that in FY 2012-13, the \$112.8 million in payroll and operations spending of FSU, together with its construction spending and the spending of its students, visitors, and alumni, created **\$266.6 MILLION** in added regional income. This is equal to approximately **0.9%** of the total Gross Regional Product of the Sandhills, and is equivalent to creating **5,128** new jobs.

IMPACT ON THE REGIONAL BUSINESS COMMUNITY

During the analysis year, FY 2012-13, FSU spent **\$68.3 MILLION** on payroll and benefits for **1,037** full-time and part-time employees, and spent another **\$44.5 MILLION** on goods and services to carry out its day-to-day operations and research. This initial round of spending creates more spending across other businesses throughout the regional economy, resulting in the commonly referred to multiplier effects. We estimate these multiplier effects in this study and report the *additional* economic activity that is created by the initial spending of FSU.* Impacts are reported in terms of total income, which is analogous to Gross Regional Product, and the corresponding number of jobs created.

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^{*} Note: Our estimated economic impacts are conservative in that we directly take into account the fact that state and local dollars spent on the university could have been spent elsewhere in North Carolina if not directed toward FSU, and thus would have created some economic impacts regardless. We account for these alternative uses of funds directly in our analysis by (i) assuming that if funds were not directed to FSU, they would have been returned to the taxpayer and generate economic impacts through household spending on goods and services, and (ii) subtracting the estimated economic impacts generated by this alternative use of funds from the estimated economic impacts of FSU. Thus, we report a net impact of FSU that is above and beyond what would have occurred had the funds been returned to the taxpayer.



These economic impacts break down as follows:

Operations spending impact

Payroll and non-pay expenditures to support day-to-day operations (less research) of FSU amounted to \$57.6 MILLION and \$38.5 MILLION, respectively. The net impact of the university's operations spending in the Sandhills during the analysis year was approximately \$75 MILLION in added regional income, which is equivalent to creating 1,127 jobs.

Research spending impact

- Research activities of FSU impact the regional economy by employing people and making purchases for equipment, supplies, and services. They also facilitate new knowledge creation throughout the Sandhills. In FY 2012-13, FSU spent \$10.7
 MILLION on payroll to support research activities.
- Research spending of FSU generates \$14.2 MILLION in added regional income for the Sandhills economy, which is equivalent to creating 216 new jobs.

Construction spending impact


- FSU built or renovated a number of its facilities during the analysis year. This spending generated a short-term infusion of income and jobs in the regional economy.
- The net impact of the university's construction spending in FY 2012-13 was \$585.9 THOUSAND in added regional income, equivalent to 17 new jobs.


Student spending impact

- Around **32%** of graduate and undergraduate students attending FSU originated from outside the region. Some of these students relocated to the Sandhills and spent money on groceries, transportation, rent, and so on at Sandhills businesses.
- The expenditures of students who relocated to the region during the analysis year added approximately \$7 MILLION in regional income for the Sandhills economy, which is equivalent to creating 161 new jobs.

Visitor spending impact

- Out-of-region visitors attracted to the Sandhills for activities at FSU brought new dollars to the economy through their spending at hotels, restaurants, gas stations, and other regional businesses.
- Visitor spending added approximately **\$1.8 MILLION** in regional income for the Sandhills economy, which is equivalent to creating **54** new jobs.

Alumni impact


- Over the years, students gained new skills, making them more productive workers, by studying at FSU. Today, thousands of these former students are employed in the Sandhills.
- The accumulated contribution of former FSU students currently employed in the Sandhills workforce amounted to **\$167.9 MILLION** in added regional income to the Sandhills economy, which is equivalent to creating **3,553** new jobs.

RETURN ON INVESTMENT TO STUDENTS, SOCIETY, AND TAXPAYERS

Student perspective

- Students attending FSU during FY 2012-13 paid a total of \$19.5 MILLION to cover the cost of tuition, fees, books, and supplies. They also forwent \$89.7 MILLION in money that they would have earned had they been working instead of learning.
- In return for the money students invest to earn their degrees, they will receive a present value of **\$332.3 MILLION** in estimated increased earnings over their working lives.
- This translates to a return of **\$3.00** in higher future income for every \$1 that students invest in their FSU education. The average annual return for students is **13.2%**.

Societal perspective

- North Carolina as a whole will receive a present value of \$1.5 BILLION in added state income over the course of the students' working lives. Communities will also benefit from \$311.3 MILLION in present value social savings related to reduced crime, lower unemployment, and increased health and well-being across the state.
- For every dollar that society spent on educations at FSU during the analysis year, North Carolina communities will receive a cumulative value of \$8.80 in benefits, for as long as the 2012-13 students of FSU remain active in the state workforce.

Taxpayer perspective

- In FY 2012-13, state taxpayers in North Carolina invested \$50.4 MILLION to support the operations of FSU. The net present value of the added tax revenue stemming from the students' higher lifetime incomes and the increased output of businesses amounts to \$143.3 MILLION in benefits to taxpayers. Savings to the public sector add another \$53.5 MILLION in benefits due to a reduced demand for government-funded services in North Carolina.
 - Dividing benefits to taxpayers by the associated costs yields a **3.9** benefit-cost ratio, i.e., every \$1 in costs returns \$3.90 in benefits. The average annual return on investment for taxpayers is **12.9%**.

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The Campus Master Plan expresses the vision for Fayetteville State University's continued physical development achieving a balance of preserving existing landmarks, new development, and renovations. This plan accommodates future growth and achievement of the University's strategic goals in line with the academic mission.

Based on the new Master Plan, the University anticipates a projected enrollment from 5,600 students to 9,600 students within the next 20 years. These recommendations will require an estimated \$500 million in capital improvements. Priority projects are also identified for implementation within the next six years. These projects will provide a decision-making framework to help the University guide the campus in its construction efforts to meet immediate needs as well as those to come in future years
