  - 3 MATH 121 may be required based on profile scores. Some core courses require a one-hour lab.
  - 4 At least one natural science class must include its associated lab. Some majors require two lab sciences, increasing requirement to 8 credits 5
  - 5 Not required for students with 30 or more transfer credits from a foreign institution. Students do not earn credit if the requirement is waived.
